Having this kind of documentation can not only help you prove you've paid your debt, but it can also help you dispute a credit reporting error if your payment information isn't updated correctly. If you're having a hard time making payments because of the COVID-19 pandemic, you're not alone. Knowing your rights is important, so if you're concerned about that 'knock at the door', here's a brief guide to dealing with the bailiffs. In cases where you're unsure who is contacting you regarding the debt, the best thing to do is to contact the original lender to find out. Who Is Considered a Debt Collector? Settling debt in

collections is probably the least fun thing you'll ever do - but that doesn't mean you should ignore it. In some cases, this could mean a nonstop litany of phone calls and notification letters. You might even be receiving calls at work. However, a collector can (and most probably would) provide the information even if you request verification after the 30-day deadline has passed. The rules allow the parties to agree to extend this deadline, but there rarely is a reason for a defendant in a debt collection lawsuit to agree to extend this deadline.

What options do you have if a debt collector violates the law? You may recover money for damages caused by the violation or an amount of money set by law. If you win the case, you can use the money remaining after paying fees to boost your savings, contribute to debts still outstanding or for any other purpose you choose. Collectors cannot call you collect without telling you the purpose of the call. In some cases, you may receive a collection call that you were fully expecting to receive. For example, don't pay with a check or give out your bank account information, especially if you think the collector may not be legitimate. Although there are those that would advise against it, a debt consolidation loan is a new loan that will pay off your old loan. The CFPB recommends creating a "realistic repayment proposal" that is based on how much you can afford in payments each month, after accounting for bills, other debt payments and emergency costs. Debt collectors may collect interest, fees, charges, or other expenses to your debt only if they are expressly authorized by the agreement creating the debt or are otherwise permitted by law.

You can stop debt collection harassment with the steps above or by filing for bankruptcy. In fact, merely mentioning that you understand your rights will, many times, stop debt collectors in their tracks. Alternatively, you could consider making a complaint to VCAT, which has the power to award up to \$10,000 compensation if you can prove that you have suffered humiliation or distress as a result of a course of conduct that is a prohibited debt collection practice. Generally speaking, the closer the statute of limitations is to expiring, the

more negotiating power you may have. In most states, the statute of limitations starts running on the date of last activity on the debt - typically the last day that you paid on the debt or 30 days after you miss a payment. The law says what debt collectors can do and what they can't do when trying to collect a debt. Notwithstanding the exclusion provided by clause (F) of the last sentence of this paragraph, the term includes any creditor who, in the process of collecting his own debts, uses any name other than his own which would indicate that a third person is collecting or attempting to collect such debts.

May be. If the debt collector sues to collect on an illegal loan and the consumer does not defend against the lawsuit, the collector will get a judgment. If a debt collector sues you and wins, part of your paycheck or other compensation could be withheld, or "garnished," by your employer and applied to your debt until it's fully repaid. Neither a collection agency nor a creditor can call you at work if your employer prohibits this type of call. They can call neighbors and employers, only to obtain contact information and that is it. If telephone calls from a collection agency are bothering you, you can order the agency to stop all contact with you by giving a written notice to cease communication with you. this difficulty. If the collection agency has been notified, the FDCPA states that they must then cease to call you at your place of employment. Repeat the process for every collection agency that calls until the calls finally stop. Even without such harmful problems, most of our clients report being embarrassed by the collection calls and letters, humiliated by being told they owe money they should never have to repay, and they suffer from having to re-live the accident over and over again. You can also record the calls of the debt collector if that is legal in your state without the permission of the collector. The person the collection letters are addressed to, lets call him John Doe, may have no clue that bill collectors are even after him. That's important. Collection agencies and creditors alike would love for all consumers to believe that living in a community property state is enough to be saddled with their spouse's debts upon their death but it simply isn't the case. All community property states treat debt after death differently, so know your state's rules before you assume you have to pay your deceased family member's collection debts after they're gone. Namely, if you were a joint account holder for the account or you live in a community property state that applies the community property rules to debt as well as assets. What you can do: Work to quickly resolve an account when contacted by a debt collector - no matter whom they represent. To collect a debt, debt collectors can reach you legally with phone calls, text messages, emails, and through the U.S. They'll give you the correct address and hang up the phone. Now - and don't screw this up - if you're playing it safe do NOT address the collection agency by name in your letter. Many debt collection companies are now using predictive dialers or automatic phone messages to contact debtors in distress. A letter from a bill

collector isn't something you ever want to see nestled between your phone bill and the pizza coupons when you check the mail - but if the collection letter has your address and someone else's name, you can breathe a temporary sigh of relief. The Fair Debt Collection Practices Act makes it perfectly clear that collectors can only discuss the debt with the debtor, not a third party (in this case, you). The debt collector contacted the debtor, seeking the debt owed along with additional costs that totaled less than the 25% that the debt collector was permitted to collect according to the contract. Accordingly, the Court permitted the debt collector to charge the percentage-based fee. Part of the difficulty in notifying a collection agency that they're sending dunning letters to the wrong address stems from the fact that the Fair Debt Collection Practices Act prohibits collectors from putting any information on the exterior of an envelope that would indicate that the communication is from a debt collector.

Send a certified check or money order to the collection agency. With an online portal, you can submit new delinquent accounts, check the status of accounts in collections and run reports to analyze the effectiveness of the collection agency's strategies. 2. Write a cease and desist letter to the collection agency noting that the only individual legally responsible for paying the debt in question is dead and that the company is not to contact his/her family members any further. 3. Mail the death certificate and cease and desist letter to the collection agency via certified mail with a return receipt requested. These fair debt collection practices mentioned in the act have been formulated to safeguard the interest of the borrowers.
