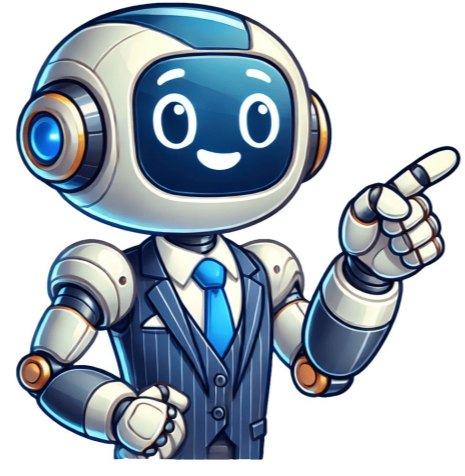

In Michigan you must be at least 14 years and 9 months old to apply for a Level 1 license (learner's permit). This is the first step in Michigan's Graduated Driver Licensing (GDL) program for all first-time drivers under 18. To apply for a Level 1 license (learner's permit) in Michigan you must bring: Proof of identity (birth certificate or passport) Proof of Social Security number (Social Security card or W-2 form) Two proofs of Michigan residency (such as bank statements, utility bills, or school records) Legal presence documentation (e.g., U.S. birth certificate, valid U.S. passport, or permanent resident card) Parent or legal guardian (if you're under 18) Payment for the application fee. If you're applying for a REAL ID compliant license, additional documentation may be required. Check the Michigan Secretary of State website for current accepted documents. Yes. If you're under 18, a parent or legal guardian must be with you at the Secretary of State office. Sign your application form Provide their identification Give their consent for you to receive your Level 1 license Your parent or legal guardian must be with you even if you've completed a driver education course The application process in Michigan is: Complete Segment 1 of an approved driver education course Go to a Secretary of State office with your parent or legal guardian Bring all required documents (identity, residency, etc.) Take a vision test Have your photo taken Pay the application fee Receive your Level 1 license (learner's permit) If you're under 18, these steps are part of Michigan's Graduated Driver Licensing program. Michigan does not allow you to apply for a Level 1 license (learner's permit) online. You must go to a Secretary of State office in person to complete the application process, provide your documents, take your vision test, and have your photo taken. The Michigan Secretary of State charges a fee for a Level 1 license (learner's permit). This fee covers the cost of processing your application and issuing your license. Check the Michigan Secretary of State website for current fee information. To get your Level 1 license (learner's permit) in Michigan you must pass: A vision test to ensure you can see well enough to drive safely Segment 1 of driver education which includes a written knowledge test Note: The written knowledge test is given as part of your driver education course, not at the Secretary of State office. The Michigan written knowledge test typically consists of multiple-choice questions about traffic laws, road signs, and safe driving practices. The exact number of questions may vary by provider, but you must score at least 70% to pass. You may need to complete additional study before retesting With a Level 1 license (learner's permit) in Michigan you can: Practice driving with a licensed parent, legal guardian, or designated licensed adult who is 21 years or older Cannot use any handheld electronic devices while driving Must ensure all occupants wear seat belts May not drive between midnight and 5 a.m., unless accompanied by a parent, legal guardian, or designated licensed adult 21 or older (or for employment purposes) In Michigan the requirements are: You must hold your Level 1 license for at least 6 months before applying for a Level 2 license (Intermediate) You must complete at least 50 hours of supervised driving practice, including 10 hours at night You must complete Segment 2 of driver education You must be violation-free and crash-free for 90 days prior to applying for your Level 2 license Michigan requires different driver education based on your age: If you are under 18: Yes, you must complete Segment 1 of driver education before obtaining a Level 1 license (learner's permit) Segment 1 includes at least 24 hours of classroom instruction, 6 hours of behind-the-wheel instruction, and 4 hours of observation time If you are 18 or older: No, driver education is not required, although it's recommended to help you become a safer driver In Michigan before you get your driver's license, the requirements depend on your age: If you are under 18: Complete Segment 1 of driver education before obtaining your Level 1 license Complete 50 hours of supervised driving practice (including 10 hours at night) with a licensed parent, legal guardian, or designated adult 21 or older Complete Segment 2 of driver education before obtaining your Level 2 license If you are 18 or older: No formal driver education is required, though it is beneficial You can find Michigan-approved driver education programs by: Checking your high school's offerings Visiting the Michigan Department of State website for a list of approved providers Looking for providers certified by the Michigan Department of State Asking for recommendations from your local Secretary of State office The Michigan driving skills test checks: Your ability to safely operate the vehicle Your knowledge and application of traffic laws Basic maneuvers such as turns, lane changes, and parking Your awareness of other road users Your decision-making in various traffic situations Before the test begins, the examiner will ensure your vehicle is properly registered, insured, and in safe operating condition (including working lights, signals, horn, brakes, and seat belts). You can schedule your driving skills test in Michigan by: Contacting an approved independent testing organization Scheduling directly with the testing organization Paying the required testing fee Michigan's driving skills tests are administered by approved independent testing organizations rather than the Secretary of State offices. On the day of your driving skills test in Michigan, bring: Your Level 1 or Level 2 license (as applicable) A properly registered and insured vehicle for the test Proof of insurance for the vehicle Proof of registration for the vehicle The required testing fee A licensed driver who is at least 18 years old to accompany you to the test site Common reasons for failing the Michigan driving skills test include: Not checking blind spots before changing lanes Rolling through stop signs instead of coming to a complete stop Driving too fast or too slow for conditions Improper lane positioning or lane changes Not yielding to pedestrians or other vehicles Poor steering control Not checking mirrors Not using turn signals properly To progress through Michigan's Graduated Driver Licensing (GDL) program: From Level 1 (learner's permit) to Level 2 (Intermediate): Hold your Level 1 for at least 6 months Complete Segment 1 of driver education Complete 50 hours of supervised driving practice (including 10 hours at night) with a licensed adult 21 or older Be violation-free and crash-free for 90 days prior to applying Pass the driving skills test Go to a Secretary of State office with a parent or legal guardian Pay the fee From Level 2 to Level 3 (full license): Hold your Level 2 for at least 6 months Be 17 years old Be violation-free and crash-free for 12 consecutive months prior to applying Go to a Secretary of State office Pay the fee Michigan's Graduated Driver Licensing (GDL) program has three stages: Level 1 License (Permit): Available at 14 years and 9 months old. Complete Segment 1 of driver education and practice with a licensed adult 21 or older. Level 2 License (Intermediate): Available at 16 years old after holding Level 1 for at least 6 months, completing Segment 2 of driver education, and completing 50 hours of supervised driving (including 10 hours at night). A driving skills test must be passed. Level 3 License (Full): Available at 17 years old after holding Level 2 for at least 6 months with a clean driving record. Adults 18 and older can apply for a regular operator's license after passing the required tests. As a Level 2 license holder in Michigan you are restricted from: Driving between 10 p.m. and 5 a.m., unless driving to/from work or if accompanied by a parent, legal guardian, or designated licensed adult 21 or older Having more than one passenger under age 21 unless they are immediate family members, or unless accompanied by a parent, legal guardian, or designated licensed adult Using a cell phone while driving (per Michigan's Kelsey's Law) These restrictions end when you obtain your Level 3 license or turn 18, whichever comes first. Michigan does not recognize out-of-state learner's permits. If you are moving to Michigan with an out-of-state permit: You will need to apply for a Michigan driver's license or permit If you're under 18, you'll need to enter Michigan's Graduated Driver Licensing program You may be required to take driver education courses depending on your age Michigan offers the following accommodations for applicants with disabilities: Modified vehicles with special equipment Adaptive equipment allowances during testing Extended testing time if needed Alternative formats of the driver's manual Special restricted licenses based on your specific needs Contact your local Secretary of State office before your appointment to request accommodations Yes, non-U.S. citizens can get a Michigan driver's license or permit by providing: Proof of identity Proof of legal presence in the United States Proof of Michigan residency Other required documents Visit the Michigan Secretary of State website for more information on documentation requirements for non-citizens You can download a copy of the Michigan Driver's Manual here. To obtain a driver's license in Michigan, you must meet the following requirements: 1. Age: You must be at least 16 years old. 2. Driver Education: You must complete a driver education course approved by the Michigan Department of State or provide proof of completion from another state or country. 3. Learner's Permit: You must hold a valid Level 1 Learner's Permit for at least 6 months before applying for a Level 2 Intermediate License. 4.
