The understanding of Shute was that women were forced to march around Sumatra for two and a half years, covering 1,900 kilometers, with less than 30 people surviving the march. However, the Nevil Shute Foundation states that this was a misunderstanding, and that women were simply transported from the prison camp to the prisoner camp by the Japanese. "Shute, fortunately misinformed about parts of his experience, misunderstood that women were made to walk. This was probably the luckiest misunderstanding of his life..." says the Foundation.
